We will again be looking for all our dancers to join us as we demonstrate our chosen hobby, and invite the audience to participate. Then over the summer, we have Dancing in the Park – and what a year! We are celebrating almost 75 years of dancing outdoors in Vancouver Parks – and, with a grant from the City of Vancouver, in support of Cultural Arts, the plan is to have music or entertainment on five of the nights. The RSCDS Vancouver Board feels that a regular update on the SCCS should be included in the White Cockade to keep all our members up to date on what is one of our biggest assets. This is a long report to get people up to date. It is anticipated the report will be shorter from hereon.

The Big Question:

The retention of the hall has been a concern for us for a number of years. It has been agreed at SCCS Board level that we continue to maintain the hall as long as it is viable both physically and financially. Incidentally, all societies agreed to this. For RSCDS Vancouver that means we maintain a dance floor and meeting rooms. For most other societies it means that they have access to financial support, so that all societies have received the funding they requested which falls within the mandate of SCCS.

Current Situation:

Income: The hall is fully booked on weekdays with the exception of Tuesdays from 10 to 1 p.m. Any takers? It has also been booked for the upcoming Federal Election, both the "day of" and for the early voting day. Regular renters such as the caterer, Montessori and church provide regular income. Weekend bookings are also doing well.

Other Financial considerations: The hall continues to make a profit in spite of various repairs that have cropped up (see below). It is important to note that the SCCS now has a contingency fund, currently standing at \$17,000 and growing monthly.

Maintenance: The icemaker required a \$1900 fix; 26 lights in the Hebridean room were replaced with more efficient units. The lift, stage draperies, and audio/video system have been replaced. All this, plus essential weather proofing has been done to ensure no repeat of the Burns 2024 "flood".

The Women's washroom: To ensure the Centre remains an

attractive space for events such as weddings, we are now embarking on a major upgrade to the Women's washroom. An application has gone into the City of Vancouver for \$25,000 (the maximum allowed) and we should hear by the end of June whether this is forthcoming. The fundraising project has stalled at \$975. The quotes to refurbish this space fully are at around \$50,000. Thus, RSCDS is working on leading this fundraising project. This includes reaching out to the regular Centre users, especially the churches, for charitable contributions. If you wish to help, please check the RSCDS or SCCS websites for the links to contribute. Or contact Darryl at SCC or Jennifer Shearman. We are also looking for anyone with graphics expertise to design a poster. RSCDS members have always given freely to assist with tasks such as landscaping, library clean-up, keeping the centre open during the pandemic and so much more. THANK YOU.

Building Envelope: The SCCS requested and received a full BECA report from JRS Engineering. Two main areas of water ingress are the back wall (kitchen/dance studio side) and the windows. The Executive Director is seeking quotes from at least three companies to upgrade the wall. We intend to tackle window replacement gradually with the application for grants through the City of Vancouver.

Assistance to Societies: The SCCS executive is working with two of the three non-charitable societies to become charities. This will also make it easier for the SCCS to assist with outside grant applications providing further financial support outside the profits made by the hall. RSCDS Vancouver can also seek this support as required.

Generally, RSCDS delegates Jennifer Shearman and Fran Hillier have been involved in extensive research into options regarding the hall; have faced direct pushback from some organizations; and it has felt like a long hard haul for the past three or four years. Currently, the groups are, if not fully pulling together, at least not fighting over what is happening. We feel optimistic about our dance space, and the current direction of maintaining the hall well to encourage renters (including ourselves) and to ensure the hall is seen as an asset by all. Our last Board Meeting was only an hour long, which seems to indicate the general agreement on the direction the SCCS is taking.
